Fish Recipe

- Perch-a-licious!

It's been a pretty good year for ice fishing (except, of course, the TRAA outing) so a perch recipe might come in handy. Here's a somewhat traditional one that's dead easy for those who might be a bit challenged in the culinary department and it's delicious. This recipe usually calls for the fish to be deepfried but it can be fried in about 3/4 inch of oil in a large, heavy skillet. Also, the original recipe called for perch fillets, any firm, white fillets such as walleye, whitefish, etc. will work.

Ingredients

- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups crushed saltine crackers (about 45 crackers)
- 2 lbs perch fillets
- vegetable oil (for frying)

Directions

Place beaten eggs and saltine cracker crumbs in separate shallow bowls or pie tins.

Dip fillets into eggs, then coat with crumbs; let stand for 5 minutes.

In a heavy, deep skillet, or electric frying pan, heat oil (about 3/4 to 1 inch of oil) to 375°.

Fry fillets, a few at a time, for 2 minutes on each side or until fish is golden brown and flakes easily.

Drain on a rack over paper towels. If you're making lots of fish place the rack in a 225° oven while you're cooking the remaining batches.

Yum.

Trout Committee

According to Dave Jeffries, this fall's batch of brown trout has been a resounding success. Elevating the trays slightly made a big difference in sac-fry survivability. All members of the trout hatchery rotation have been very diligent in making the rounds or having the responsibility to make sure there's a substitute when they can't make it. These and other smaller details has made this one of the best batches in terms of low mortality that we've had in years.

All members are invited to suggest possible donor streams into which these brown trout fry can be released. Any stream considered will be a tributary of the Thames River and must be downstream of Fanshawe and Hunt Dams.

Rainbow trout eggs will be a part of the TRAA trout hatchery scene within a month or so.

It's a tradition for the TRAA to try and gather some of the eggs and milt from rainbows returning to Komoka Creek and this year will be no different.

We will be contacting John Schwindt of the UTRCA to come out to Komoka Creek with his electro-fishing gear over the next few weeks. If you have not been involved in one of these outings, ask anyone who's done it, it's worth getting signed up!
